For successful business deals and relationships, have you ever thought about using a little magic? Magician Joe M. Turner shared how he incorporates his tricks illusions into the business world as he entertained the 2013 Annual Meeting and Banquet of the Cherokee County Chamber of Commerce.

"Here is what is going to happen," said Turner. "I am going to show you an assortment of different kinds of experiences.

"Tonight we are all about fun, to entertain you, give you things to look at, think about and hopefully we we all have a great time," said Turner.

Turner began the entertainment with card tricks and then provided illusions for each side of the room, making it look as if he was growing at one point, shrinking at another

"You look at this and it made me look like I was getting smaller and then you looked at this and it made it look like I was getting bigger," said Turner. "And we all know that none of those things is actually happening. But you look at this first and it changed the way that you saw me. And that is a powerful message for leaders, managers, branch managers, for students is that things you look at always affect the way that you see the world from that point forward. What you feed in always changes the way that you see the world and therefore changes the way you make decisions and some people think that it doesn't matter what you see or what billboard is on the side of the road.'

"But all of those messages

feed in and it always changes what you look at, what you see," said Turner. "Sometimes what you look at makes things seem smaller than they reall ought to be. Some things seem less important than they really are and other things you look at you see things more than they probably should be. You can probably make a list of the things that culture says aren't important that really are and the things that the culture says are superimportant that maybe aren't. It is just a critical thing to remember to have something to focus on that doesn't change from week to week, day to day and year to year so you can make decisions based on values that are steady.

"It's like I try to always explain," said Turner. "If you are stuck on a raging stream and you are stuck on the rocks and you think some of the rocks are bigger or smaller than they

are how in the world are you going to get across unless you can see things the way they really are the way they really were created?

For the finale of the show, Turner asked a member of the audience to donate a ring which he made "disappear". A few minutes later, it "emerged" in another part of the room.

"Sometimes we will find what we value the most in places we least expect," said
